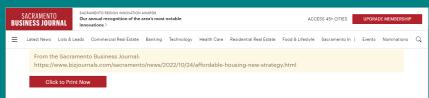

#### City leaders outline shift in affordable housing strategy with planned \$35M investment for multiple projects

#### Oct 24, 2022, 2:26pm PDT

A vote Tuesday by the Sacramento City Council would not only move two housing projects with an affordable component to the starting line, it would also represent a shift in city policy.

The \$35 million planned for multiple projects could have been used for starting and operating a shelter for people without homes, for a year or two, said City Councilmember Katie Valenzuela at an announcement event Monday morning.

"Moving upstream means more affordable housing," she said, explaining how the change in direction by the city addresses a city housing crisis on a more permanent basis than by spending money to create a new shelter or "safe ground" camping site.

If approved, the city's investment would create 820 new affordable units, across projects from South Sacramento to Oak Park to near Downtown Sacramento to Old North

Road and Woodbine Avenue in South Sacramento. Nonprofit transportation new affordable housing units Paratransit Inc. will sell the vacant land at that site to developers Fulcrum ar Inc., who will then start as soon as next spring there on a four-story, 216-uni

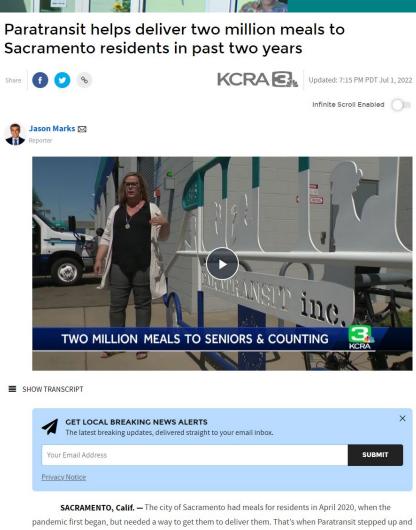

#### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

Receive and file the Chief Financial Officer's Report.

#### **BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:**

All financial data are through October 2022 and operating data are through November 2022 unless otherwise noted.

- CTSA partner agency trips continue to grow, and are now at 60,273 from July to November 2022. While CTSA trips completely stopped during the pandemic, they are coming back rapidly. Most programs will be open 5 days per week starting in January 2023. CTSA agency trips are approximately 2/3 of ADA trips, and we expect them to equal the number of ADA trips within a few months.
- Contracted transportation trips are growing steadily; average monthly billable hours are as high as pre-pandemic levels. There were on average 1,738 billable hours pre-pandemic whereas the average for July through November 2022 was 2,100 billable hours.
- Meals delivered from July 2022 through November 2022 include 57,900 meals delivered for the Sacramento Food Bank and Family Services and 2,000 meal kits delivered from Canon Restaurant for local seniors.
- Between July 2022 and November 2022, the Sacramento Mobility Management program successfully travel trained 50 elderly/disabled passengers and 85 youth.
- The CTSA program, where Paratransit, Inc. partners with local social service agencies, continues providing support with insurance expense, maintenance and fleet management, fuel reimbursement, buses, and driver support. Between July and November 2022 Paratransit's maintenance department completed 1,176 work orders.

- Between July and November 2022, Paratransit, Inc. has received \$34,700 in income from renting out our accessible minivans.
- Year-to-date revenue is 9% lower than budgeted; year-to-date expense is 10% lower than budgeted. Paratransit's net income is \$4,000.

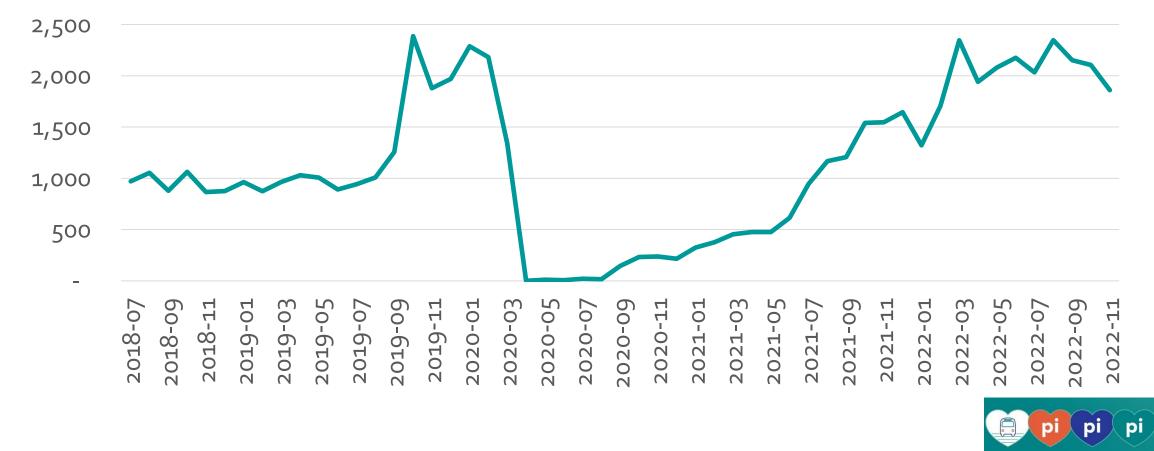

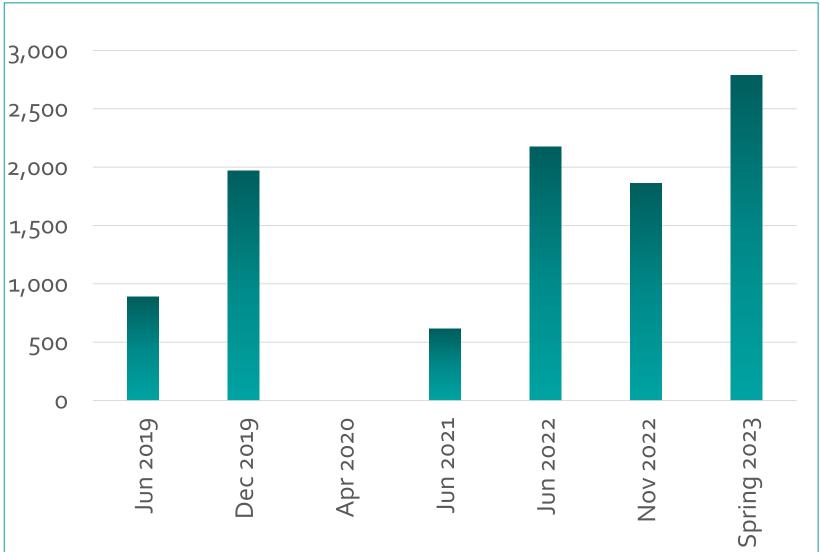


## Contracted Transportation Billable Hours Fiscal Years 18/19 through current

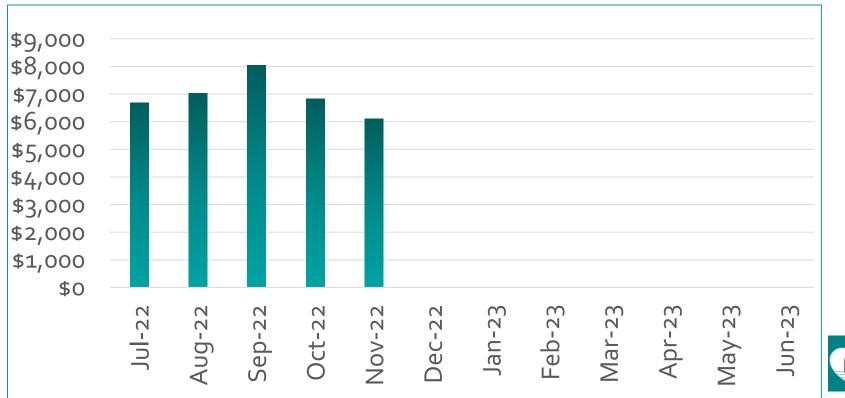

## Accessible Vehicle Rental Income

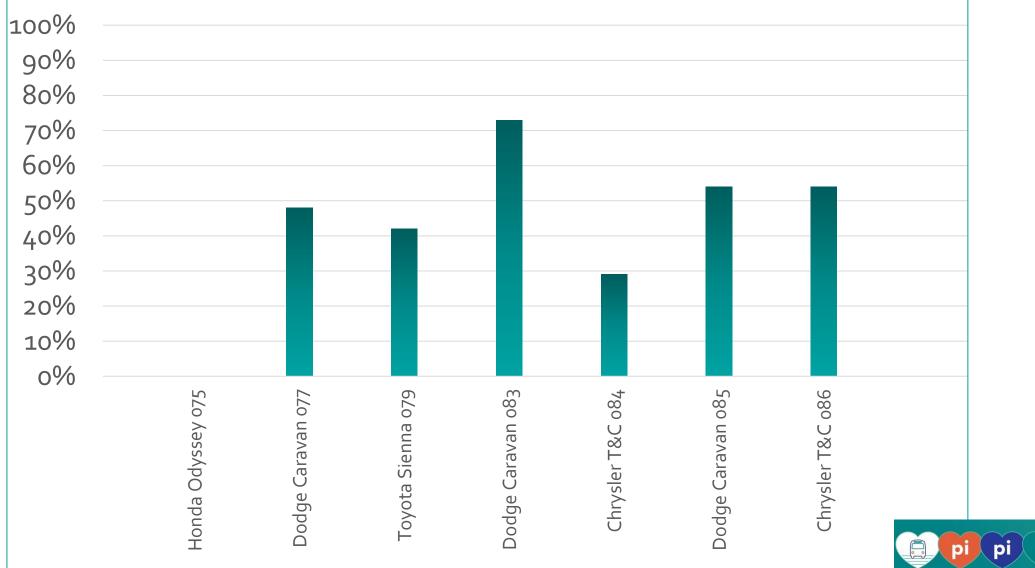

#### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

Adopt Resolution 17-22 approving continuance of remote board meetings.

#### **BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:**

The Brown Act is a state law that establishes the procedural framework for members of local government decision-making bodies to meet, debate, and act. The Act is designed to ensure that the public is informed about the views, discussions, and actions of governing officials. Paratransit is subject to the Brown Act.

On March 12, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order No. N-25-20 that waived certain requirements of the Brown Act including:

- the requirement that the notice of each meeting location be provided for those members of the legislative body (board or committee) participating in the meeting;
- the requirement that each meeting location be accessible to members of the public;
- the requirement that members of the public be able to address the legislative body (board and committee) at each meeting location;

 the requirement that agencies post agendas at all meeting locations; and • the requirement that at least a quorum of the legislative body (board and committee) participate from locations within the boundaries of the territory over which they exercise jurisdiction.

With the Executive Order in place, Paratransit has been holding it's meetings remotely over Zoom since the beginning of the pandemic. In September, the Governor signed Assembly Bill (AB) 361, which amends the Brown Act to allow continued flexibility for public meetings following the expiration of the Governor's Executive Order. The provisions of AB 361 regarding remote meetings can only be used in the event there is a Governor issued state of emergency that is active under the California Emergency Services Act and a legislative body makes a determination by resolution that there is a need to meet remotely. The Governor's state of emergency presently remains in effect. Staff recommends that the committee adopt a resolution that the committee is holding a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency, and state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing. An additional stipulation of the legislation is that legislative bodies must approve by resolution the decision to meet remotely every 30 days. As such, we will bring this item to the board every meeting while a state of emergency exists.

#### APPROVING CONTINUANCE OF REMOTE BOARD MEETINGS

**WHEREAS,** the Paratransit, Inc. Board of Directors is committed to preserving public access and participation in meetings; and

**WHEREAS**, all meetings of the Paratransit, Inc. Board of Directors are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 – 54963, the "Brown Act"), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and observe the agency conduct its business; and

**WHEREAS**, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), provides for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

**WHEREAS**, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

**WHEREAS**, such conditions now exist in the State, specifically, the Governor of the State of California proclaimed a state of emergency on March 4, 2020, related to the threat of COVID-19, which threat remains; and

**WHEREAS**, California Department of Public Health and the Federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention caution that the Delta and Omicron variants of COVID- 19, currently the dominant strains of COVID-19 in the country, are more transmissible than prior variants of the virus, may cause more severe illness, and that even fully vaccinated individuals can spread the virus to others resulting in rapid and alarming rates of COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations; and

**WHEREAS**, on September 28, 2021, the County of Sacramento Public Health Officer recommended social distancing measures and that local legislative bodies in the County

of Sacramento use certain available teleconferencing options in order to help minimize the spread and transmission of COVID-19; and

**WHEREAS**, the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health ("Cal/OSHA") regulations at Title 8 Section 3205 recommends physical distancing in the workplace as precautions against the spread of COVID-19 and imposes certain restrictions and requirements due to a "close contact" which occurs when individuals are within six feet of another in certain circumstances;

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE PARATRANSIT, INC. Chief Executive Officer Tiffani Fink provided an oral report on agency activities and contracts, including an interview she gave on the need to link food and housing with mobility, receipt of a grant from the USDA to provide a shuttle from the Pannell Center to the Florin Road Farmer's Market, the promotion of Alicia Brown to the Director of Strategic Initiatives and Mobility, participation in the California Capital Air Show where Paratransit transported 900 people, two buses being used in Run to Feed the Hungry, and the Winter Wish List holiday drive which will provide 2240 boxes to seniors and people with disabilities. CEO Fink thanked Director Nguyen for her service and announced she is vacating her position after the meeting due to her election to the State Assembly. Director Tucker said she will miss Director Nguyen but is super proud of her. Director Nguyen said she loves hearing about the housing and it is a tribute to CEO Fink's leadership.

Chief Financial Officer Lisa Cappellari reviewed her written staff report of financial measures through September 2022 and operating data through October 2022.

# ACTION ITEMS

A. <u>Discussion and Appointment of a Two New Board Members for a 3</u> year term, beginning January 1, 2023

CEO Fink informed the Board four positions will be vacant, three as of December 31, 2022 and one as of November 22, 2022. Due to the lack of successor language in the By-Laws and challenges with guorum, she has presented two candidates to the Board President for consideration and will present two more in December. Tonight the proposed candidates are Jim Alves and Leigh White. They would fill the seats vacated by Directors Nguyen and Fontus. Director Hume shared these candidates were interviewed last year, along with Director Tucker and while they were not selected, they both are highly qualified and have good backgrounds to serve on the Board. Director Shekhar shared it was a tough decision last year, and he is supportive of them joining the Board. CEO Fink shared they both have continued to meet with her and make introductions to further Paratransit business even though they were not appointed last year. Director Nguyen said she knows Jim and he checks many of the boxes we need filled. Director Tucker has worked with them both and we would be fortunate to have them. She shared that Leigh is entrepreneurial and has national media connections and Jim is good with partnership development. Director Fontus knows both candidates and said they are both well-positioned to share Paratransit's story, are kind people and aligned with the mission.

Director Fontus moved to appoint Jim Alves and Leigh White to fill Director Fontus and Nguyen's seats. The motion was seconded by Director Tucker and passed unanimously.

B. Discussion and Possible Action to Authorize the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and Chief Financial Officer (CFO) to begin the formation of a New 501(c3) for the purposes of developing a housing project on Woodbine Avenue, engage legal services to prepare all necessary legal documentation and to finalize final steps for potential Project Adoption at the December 2022 Board meeting CEO Fink reviewed the proposal for a 216 unit housing development on the Woodbine Avenue property where all units would be accessible and Housing Choice vouchers would be accepted. She shared the CTSA succeeds because of the strength of partnerships and the region's housing problem won't be solved by putting people in a home where they aren't connected to community, including food, transportation and supportive services. Currently with commitments from nonprofits, the development is almost fully occupied and the agencies are working together to determine what services each nonprofit can provide to all residents. The goal is this development will become a model for housing in other areas. CEO Fink said she will have financials to present next month but is asking for the Board's approval to engage with legal counsel to create the new 501(c3) for this project.

Director Hume said this is exciting and he likes the synergy of the organizations and the concept of providing value added services to the residents. He does want to ensure we do not create another Innovative Paradigms (IP) situation. CEO Fink explained IP was a department with no DBA designation or clear lines of reporting and this would be different as it would be a familial nonprofit that reports back to the Paratransit Board. Finances would be separate for the agencies, the new nonprofit would invoice Paratransit for services provided and Paratransit would retain the asset if the nonprofit dissolves. Director Tucker is interested in a tour of the KIND Project and shared she has seen examples of other nonprofits doing this type of work and knows the horror stories if a separate nonprofit is not created for the housing project. Director Shekhar asked if there is any benefit to not setting up a new nonprofit and why create a nonprofit versus a for profit organization. CEO Fink responded with a nonprofit it is easier to have the loan forgiven and there is a lower tax liability. A private nonprofit would have reduced transparency on the books, but it can be open to the public and follow the same rules as Paratransit. Director Hume said having the new nonprofit creates a strong firewall to protect Paratransit's assets.

Director Shekhar moved to authorize staff to move forward and engage with legal counsel on the formation of a new nonprofit for developing housing on the Woodbine Property. ## **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

Discussion and Possible Action to Develop the Property at 7141 Woodbine Avenue for an innovative, supportive housing project, creation of a new c(2) to own and operate the housing development, and execute all funding necessary to complete the project.

## BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:

In September of 2020, the Board of Directors adopted the first Strategic Development Plan. In April 2022, the Board of Directors engaged in an indepth review of the agency Strategic Development Plan and in June 2022, the Board adopted the second update.

Included in the Business Development Plan was an item to develop the 2.5 acre vacant parcels owned by Paratransit on Woodbine Avenue, adjacent to the main administrative offices. Staff discussed this item with the Board in April and was given approval to explore the options related to developing housing on the parcels. The CEO and CFO have been engaged in active discussions with the City of Sacramento and the development team of Urban Elements and Fulcrum Properties. Together a project has been designed to

construct 216 units of attainable, supportive housing that would rent within the Housing Choice Voucher limits.

The main concept for the project would be to borrow the partnership structure used in our mobility partnership programs and apply them to the new housing project. 6 local non-profits have signed on as interested partners in securing housing at the potential location. These non-profits include Lutheran Social Services, Waking the Village, Resources for Independent Living, Creative Living Options, City Year and the Sacramento LGBT Community Center. In addition, staff is exploring conversations with two of our existing partners (Salvation Army and St. John's Program for Change) who are interested in collaborating on the housing program as well. In addition to providing clients to secure the housing units, each of the nonprofits is committed to providing supportive services to the site. Staff is exploring property management operators and will have more specifics for the Board at the meeting.

On October 25<sup>th</sup>, the Sacramento City Council adopted a new strategic approach to the housing crisis in Sacramento with a focus on development of permanent housing solutions. Included in that approach was a commitment of a 55 year, receipts only loan (with opportunity for debt forgiveness) of \$8.4 million. It passed the City Council unanimously. The City has signed on as a partner and would be able to directly refer 10 individuals from their programs into the on-site housing.

Staff is continuing to work on the fine details and financing package for this project and will bring that forward in detail with consideration of formal project approval. In order to proceed with bringing this project forward several next steps now require Board approval. These items include: creation of potential partnership agreements with the non-profits, development of a formal letter of intent, authorization to sell our property to the development team, authorization to bind all financing and authorization to create, incorporate and staff a new501 c(2) for the housing project. Staff, legal and the proposed development team will present more in-depth information on these items at the meeting and answer questions.

# FISCAL IMPACT:

All current activities are included within the existing budget. Cost for future expanded services such as providing services and maintenance would be offset by secured revenues for the development of the project and by ongoing operating revenues. The new housing c(2) will adopt the annual operating budget for the c(2) and new proceeds will go to Paratransit, Inc after all debts are paid.
